Domestic Geographic Name Proposal Form

The U.S. Board on Geographic Names (BGN) is responsible for standardizing the names of geographic features within the 50 States and in other areas under the sovereignty of the United States. The BGN retains the legal authority to promulgate all official names and locations of natural features (e.g. mountains, rivers, valleys), as well as canals, channels, reservoirs, and other select feature types.

This form is to propose a new name or name, spelling, or application change for a geographic feature for Federal use. A proponent should carefully review the proposal prior to submission to ensure that it is consistent with the BGN policies. Please note all fields with a red outline are required prior to submitting this form.

The proponent should also be aware that the entire proposal—including personal identifying information and any associated correspondence—is in the public domain and may be made publicly available at any time.

Kelseyville is an unincorporated town in Lake County, CA. at the intersection of State Route 29 and Kelsey Creek, a few miles south of Clear Lake. Its population is 3,500 The town itself (the Census Designated Place) is about 3 miles square, with one main street.

The Zip code of the same name is about 10 miles square and includes communities such as Soda Bay, Buckingha, and various Rivieras.

The area is dominated by Mount Konocti, an active volcano which rises 3000 feet above Big Valley, and is accessed by road from Kelseyville.

Name Details

Out of respect for the local tribes and to promote healing in the community, we propose that the BGN changes the town 's name to Konocti. The name Kelsey is offensive to the local tribes and to many residents throughout the County. Changing the name to 'Konocti' is a gesture to acknowledge the wrongs done to the original inhabitants of Lake County.

Konocti is a volcanic mountain that stands ~3,000 feet above Clear Lake, named by the East Lake Tribe of Elem, the oldest existing tribe. They have lived in the area for over 14,000 years. The widespread use of the name Konocti by local business, art, and education communities evokes images of nature, art, music and recreation.

Kelseyville, sitting at the base of Mt. Konocti, is currently named after a brutal man. Andy Kelsey and partner Charles Stone enslaved, starved, abused, raped, tortured and murdered the Pomos living under their control. In 1849, the Pomo held a tribal court and decided to execute Kelsey and Stone.

In revenge for their deaths, brothers Ben and Sam Kelsey, and their posse stormed Napa and Sonoma Counties indiscriminately killing Pomos. The Pomos have not forgotten the Kelseys or the repercussions which continue to affect them.
